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A hole in one for community health!

The Grande Ronde Hospital Foundation has partnered with the La Grande Country Club to host another expanded version of northeast Oregon's premier golf classic with three days of opportunities to hit the fairway.

Golfers in the 22nd Grande Ronde Amateur will have the option to compete on Friday, Saturday or Sunday, Sept. 9 to 11. Golfers just need to play two out of the three days at the La Grande Country Club.

On Sunday afternoon, there will be two Sole Survivor competition divisions. One division is top ten low gross; second division next ten low gross and top ten low net paired in teams. Senior players (60 and older) can play from the shorter tees and will be eligible for the two-person Sole Survivor competition.

There will also be separate men's and women's divisions for this year's tournament. The 2016 Amateur will be one of the most widely competitive tournaments in the area!

One hundred percent of the fundraising will be dedicated toward the purchase of a new 3-D mammogram machine, the first of its kind in Eastern Oregon; as well as an advanced hematology analyzer for faster, more accurate blood tests (see "Focused on High-Tech Health Care"). The Foundation will be fundraising for these projects for the rest of the calendar year.

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Focused on high-tech health care

On June 30, the Grande Ronde Hospital Foundation kicked off fundraising for two new vital pieces of equipment.

The Foundation is raising funds to purchase a 3-D mammography machine—the first of its kind in Eastern Oregon. The 3-D imaging allows for better scan density, making scans more accurate and decreasing

the likelihood of patients' needing a follow-up scan. Patients will no longer need to travel out of the area to get these scans.

The Foundation is also focusing its fundraising efforts on purchasing a new hematology analyzer for the Regional Medical Clinic laboratory. The new machine will be able to perform a five-part white blood count (WBC) differential, compared to the current machine's three-part WBC differential. This will allow for a more accurate and more efficient detection of blood abnormalities.

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DOCTORS of osteopathic medicine (DOs) offer a distinct form of medical practice that provides all the benefits of modern medicine (prescription drugs, surgery, modern technology to diagnose and evaluate disease, etc.) with the added benefit of hands-on diagnosis and treatment through a system of therapy known as osteopathic manipulative medicine. Osteopaths typically emphasize health promotion and disease prevention. Grande Ronde Hospital currently employs 11 DOs across eight specialties within its medical staff.

Skilled physicians

DOs complete four years of medical school. They also spend three to eight years in internships, residencies and fellowships.

Although there are DOs in every medical specialty, most practice in

primary care fields, such as family medicine, pediatrics and obstetricsgynecology. Like MDs, they must pass state licensing examinations in order to practice.

When you see a DO, you can expect the latest in medical techniques and services. DOs diagnose and treat illnesses and prescribe medicine, and some perform surgery. They also are trained to treat the patient as a whole person and to emphasize wellness and healthy lifestyles.

These physicians help relieve the growing shortage of physicians in the U.S. Their contribution is especially important because DOs often practice in rural and urban areas where access to medical care can be difficult.

Healing touch

DOs focus special attention on the musculoskeletal system. They practice a hands-on system of gentle pressure, stretching and resistance to move muscles and joints.

This technique is called osteopathic manipulative treatment. It's one tool DOs use to help prevent, diagnose and treat illnesses.

A growing field

About 7 percent of physicians in the U.S. are DOs, and that number is rapidly rising. Today, about 1 in 5 medical students is attending an osteopathic medical school.
